

Six Weeks of Compassion 2016

Where You Stay, I Will Stay

Compton Heights Christian Church is known as the *Sanctuary in the City*, but we also have made a commitment to be a Global Mission Congregation. Not only do we support our denomination's missions, but we spend **six weeks** every summer exploring ways to accompany and stand with people experiencing the pain of hunger, poverty, war, injustice, natural disasters, and lack of opportunity.

In February, we sent an offering to Week of Compassion in response to the refugee crisis. This summer, we will gather items for kits for women in Missouri prisons, bring food and supplies for Isaiah 58 Ministries, and give money that will be divided between Week of Compassion and Church World Service, our agencies that respond to crises and empower people in poverty throughout the world.

There are several ways you can participate:

- 1. Use the **3-week sharing calendar** available on Sundays near the worship bulletins to be reminded of the abundant blessings we have received, as well as the suffering in the world we can help address with our offerings. Please take time to read each day's entry, to reflect and to pray. If you like, you may use one of the refugee tent coin banks to save whatever units of coin you choose, or you may simply want to note the amount you will give to our offering.
- 2. Learn more about Missouri's interdenominational **Festival of Sharing** and our project to compile kits for incarcerated women in Missouri prisons. This project was chosen out of many possibilities, because it also relates to our congregation's work for justice and racial reconciliation. This December, more than 1,800 kits with shampoo, toothpaste, skin cream, and other comforting items will be presented to the Women's Correctional Facility in Vandalia, MO.. The women work at prison jobs to pay for their room and board, and they are paid \$8.25 a month, which is all they have for discretionary purchases. Items are limited to those that are allowed. Please follow the lists that will be available August 7.
- 3. Learn more about **Church World Service**, the interdenominational agency we support that works in tandem with Week of Compassion to help displaced people and provide development assistance to people in impoverished areas around the globe. We will have an opportunity to help create safe learning spaces, provide clean water, and assist family farmers.
- 4. Get an update about the work that **Isaiah 58 Ministries**, at home in our building, is doing to address hunger, unemployment, wellness and basic needs in our community. And bring some stuff they need.
- 5. Discover the many faithful ways that **Week of Compassion** is serving people who are still recovering from disasters that have upended their lives and communities...staying with them long after the first-responding groups have moved on. Hence our theme: **Where you Stay, I will Stay.**

Monetary offerings for Week of Compassion and Church World Service will be received on <u>August 21, 28 and Sept.</u> 4. Food and supplies for Isaiah 58 can be brought any week throughout the year. Items for **Women's Prison Packs** will be counted and assembled on Sept. 4. **All** of our gifts will be dedicated in worship on Sept. 11.

Please mark your calendar to attend the <u>Festival of Sharing ShareFest</u> on Saturday, Oct. 8, 9:30 a.m.-1 p.m.at Immanuel UCC, Ferguson. Kits will be delivered, and there will be lunch and worship! The statewide Festival of Sharing will be Oct. 15 at the state fairgrounds in Sedalia, MO.

Also plan to be present for Spotlight on India with a presentation in worship by Dr. Anil and Dr. Teresa Henry, followed by a pot luck lunch and more information about India on Sunday, Sept. 25 at CHCC. A group of 6 from our congregation will return to India in January of 2017 to spend time at Family Village Farm, visit our Global Ministries Partners, and deepen partnership. This fall, the congregation will have the opportunity to help us prepare for this trip!

2016 Six Weeks of Compassion Kit Project: Missouri Women's Prison Pack

The Festival of Sharing will host a Christmas event on December 17 at the Women's Correctional Facility in Vandalia, MO. The goal is to have one pack for each of the 1,800 women incarcerated there. Festival staff will have the opportunity to personally deliver the donated prison packs to the women and to offer a worship service of hope. Please pray for this effort!

Why Prison Packs?

Unless an offender is working on a GED, or is unable to work because of a disability, she is required to work at a regular job at the prison. If an offender has a high school diploma or GED, these jobs pay \$8.25 a month. (That is not a misprint. **A month**.) If she doesn't have a high school diploma she makes \$7.50 a month. Some offenders have families that "put money on their books" so they can purchase hygiene items, snacks, etc. in the prison store. But a good number of offenders receive only their monthly job pay to spend. The state of Missouri supplies offenders 3 hot meals a day, all of the cold water they can drink, a warm room, a bed, state soap (that smells like lard and has the texture of fine sandpaper) and a basic grade of toilet paper.

Imagine the excitement you would have if you were to receive a gift of additional basic hygiene items if you were living on a budget of \$7.50 or \$8.50 a month! Festival staff members report that many of the women with limited funds cry for joy when they receive these items.

Below is the list of what is allowed. Each kit will be assembled and packed in a gallon size zip bag on September 4, the final Sunday of Six Weeks of Compassion. Please follow the list to the letter for sizes and ingredients. No alcohol (ethyl alcohol is the usual alcohol appearing in cosmetics) is allowed in the toothpaste, shampoo, deodorant or hand cream. Read ingredients carefully. Some suggested brands are below. Note that shampoo must be transparent, not opaque. Suggestions for the most economical choices are on the back of this page. Please follow this list exactly because items not allowed will be removed. Items can be found at Wal-Mart, Dollar Tree, Walgreens and other fine stores.

Women's Prison Pack Items 2016

1 bottle shampoo, 12-16 oz size.

must be transparent, no alcohol.

Suggested brands: Prell, Suave, VO5, Herbal Escapes, etc.

1 tube Petroleum Jelly or dry skin cream. 4 oz size. Must be alcohol free and must be a tube. No tubs or bottles. (This was requested by the chaplain because of the harsh effect of the prison soap on dry skin in winter.) One cream suggested is Udderly Smooth Hand Cream in 2 or 4 oz size. Another option sometimes hard to find is the Vaseline petroleum jelly in a 3.25 oz tube.

1 toothpaste tube, 6-6.4 oz. Check to see it is alcohol free. Suggested brands: Ultrabrite advanced whitening, Crest cavity protection, etc.

1 stick deodorant, 2-3 oz size. Alcohol free. No roll-ons, aerosols or men's brands. Suggested brand: Arm and Hammer Essentials 2.5 oz unscented.

1 emery board (these come in multiple packs so we may just purchase one or two to be divided.)

Expense Report

YTD Expenses (7/31) \$83,515.70 Monthly Expense total for July \$12, 477.98

(The cash deficit on all church accounts for the year as of 7/31 was \$3335 (which is less than Judi's budget number since we have not spent 59.6% of the budget) And adjusted deficit for 7/31 is closer to \$7300 due to the timing of cash receipts and expenses which were for 2015 but but cleared the bank in 2016. This also includes adjustments for accrued expenses that we will pay by year end. I tend to think the \$7300 number communicates a more accurate picture of the church's deficit position.
