CROSSPATHS

One would think that we choose the things that are easiest for us; the ways of being that seem to come naturally. And I suppose that most often we do. Yet I've realized that it is increasingly important for me to go to places that are difficult for me. It is definitely not for the purpose making myself uncomfortable. It is rather that

there really are some aspects of living in God's world that I believe are important, even though they are hard for me. For example, I want to spend time in public places, to push myself to be around and engage with people who are different from myself. (This from one who craves space and time alone!) But I believe that if we continue to withdraw from each other – into our houses, behind our gates, on our mountain-tops, or even in our churches -- our public life will continue to deteriorate as Jesus knew it would, and as Quaker theologian Parker Palmer said It would in his book, *The Company of Strangers*.

Palmer considers that a part of the role of the church (i.e. us!) is to renew public life. The public is where we are interdependent. We share the public space not because we agree with each other, or even know each other, but because we all belong. We all belong in the public park, on the public street, at the public library where what we have in common is our dignity as human beings.

Palmer says that our public life has broken down in this country because we have begun to regard strangers as enemies. Barbara Brown Taylor describes that "the strangers we meet must either be kept out of our lives or made like us, which wreaks havoc with our public life. The endless variety of humankind becomes a threat, not a blessing, and the whole body suffers." (*BBT, Home by Another Way*)

The one we call Lord and Savior is the Jesus who welcomes and cares for the stranger, who chooses to hang out among those who are the outcasts, who pushes the edges of the religious community until it meets with the public.

The Jesus that the disciples followed is the one who led them down from the mountain of transfiguration and back to live out ministry in the threatening public of Jerusalem.

This Lent, I feel called *not* to withdraw, but to go out in public to see where the Christ leads. (Okay, I'll have to pull back occasionally to buck up my courage, but if I stay with Jesus, we'll be right out there!)



Other ways

On February 29, 2012, two windows of our steeple were damaged in a windstorm. We received an insurance settlement for \$10,270 to repair them, but the lowest and best bid we received to replace all four and the siding was \$22,600. In July, the Board of Ministry approved Frank Sager and Son, Inc. to replace all four existing steeple windows with white vinyl windows that will be similar in size and shape to the existing windows, and cover the remainder of the steeple with maintenance free white vinyl siding. Shortly after work began, we were informed by the City of St. Louis that we needed special architectural drawings and a special permit from the Cultural Planning Office. Two trustees met with a representative of the Cultural Review Board on Jan. 15, 2013 and we are waiting for a go-ahead to resume the work. We may be ordered to

make changes that add to the cost. Meanwhile, we have started to raise the funds.

Financial Goal: **\$15,000** is the amount we currently need to raise to complete the original plan from Frank Sager and Son for the repair described above. We are hoping that new requirements from the Cultural Review Board will not increase our costs. The difference between the insurance check and the repair estimate was \$12,330. We added 15% contingency to this and also the additional cost of architectural drawings (\$300) and permit fee (\$250) so far, and rounded it up just for good measure.

PRINTER CARTRIDGE RECYCLING

Thank you all for contributing your used printer cartridges for recycling! Our box for these is across from the choir room on the shelf.

Last year your used cartridges turned into:

- 1. two color LaserJet printer cartridges for the color printer,
- 2. 5000 sheets of legal size paper for bulletins,
- 3. 5000 sheets of letter size paper for newsletters and general office use,
- 4. a lightweight 8' plastic top table with folding legs,
- 5. an abundance of hot chocolate packets for Happy Friday, and
- 6. boxes of 3 oz. cups and nice, heavy napkins for the Children Worship and Wonder program.

We get \$2 for each used inkjet or LaserJet printer cartridge you contribute, plus 10% of whatever we spend on paper and printer cartridges. See Dave Boger if you'd like information on how to credit your Office Depot purchases toward the church or toward Isaiah 58 Ministries.

ALUMINUM and other METAL RECYCLING - After 21 months of collecting, on January 25, we turned in your 142 pounds of crushed aluminum cans, 24 pounds of brass, 12 pounds of zinc, 8 pounds of miscellaneous aluminum (including aluminum foil), and 4 pounds of dead Christmas tree lights for \$138.80! We are also collecting copper (water pipes, wiring), but need to meet the 15 pound minimum before we can turn it in. Our crushed can recycling bin is inside the kitchenette door, up high. Please talk to Dave Boger if you have other metals to contribute.

Thank you all for participating in our recycling effort. Your metal recycling for this year is going toward the Steeple Fund. We last turned in aluminum cans in April 2011, and got \$196.50 for 262 pounds. Those cans benefited Compton Cares. Thank you!

SOLES for SOULS

Thank you all for contributing good, used shoes for Soles for Souls OR for Isaiah 58. The box in the office hallway has been slowly filling with shoes since our last campaign. Thank you!

MEDICINE BOTTLES FOR THE HUMANE SOCIETY


