Grounding Prayer

I am thankful that I grew up praying. The first prayers I remember were my bedtime prayers. “Now I lay me down to sleep . . .” followed by naming everyone for whom I wanted to pray; Mommy and Daddy, Granny and Granddaddy, Mamaw and Gramps, other family and friends and Cookie, our dog. As I grew older, I taught myself other night-time prayers, ones that were particularly meaningful to me and my prayers for others expanded. There was a time in Jr. High when I would sing to myself the lullaby “All Through the Night.” There were also the prayers we prayed at the table, the earliest one being “God is great, God is good. Let us thank God for our food . . .” And of course there were the learned and extemporaneous prayers the adults prayed at the table. At church, of course, I learned The Lord’s Prayer, and for a period of time in my youth, each Sunday the congregation prayed aloud: “May the words of our mouths and the meditations our hearts be acceptable in your sight, O Lord, our strength and our redeemer.”

The practice of praying the structured prayers of the community was a gift to me, and I believe it to be an important part of our learning to pray. Grounded in that foundation, we learn to pray freely the prayers of our hearts. We learn to give thanks, and to pray for the needs of the world. We learn to simply be with God; to meditate on our breath and God’s Breath. I have discovered through the years that the prayers I know by heart are there as a place to begin when I cannot find the words or hear God’s voice. A friend of mine in college, who was a prisoner of war in Vietnam, spoke of relying on the prayer he knew by heart. While imprisoned, other soldiers asked him to teach them the Lord’s Prayer and he did.

Since 2001, a prayer I pray on regular basis is from the Society of Missionaries of Mercy: *“Spirit Mercy, enliven within me a willingness to be loved so that I may love; a desire to be healed so that I may heal; a longing to be embraced by your gentleness so that I may become tender-hearted; a wanting to spend my life on God’s Kingdom and to become a generous distributor of Mercy. Help me to become a worthy vessel to carry for others the oils of gladness and joy. I ask this through Jesus Christ the Lord of Mercy.”* In these days, may you find your grounding prayers. In prayer, *Jacque*

Hope Partnership presents Chuukese leadership development event

[Hope Partnership](#) for Missional Transformation sponsored and organized the Chuukese Leadership Development Event Oct. 23-25 in Athens, TX. This history-making event brought together pastors and leaders from Chuukese congregations throughout the United States. An estimated 100 people were in attendance at the event held at the Disciples Crossing Camp and Retreat Center.

According to Gilberto Collazo, president of Hope Partnership, in addition to a variety of educational offerings, 10 Chuukese congregations had the opportunity to learn about Disciples history and polity during a workshop offered by Rev. Tiffany Williams, director of programming for the Disciples Crossing Camp and Retreat Center. The event also included workshops that provided opportunities for ministry contextualization conversations by Jinsuk Chun, executive pastor of [North American Pacific/Asian Disciples](#) and Collazo.

"The event would not have been a success without the collaborative efforts from our Disciples ministry partners," says Collazo. Ministries and leaders working with Hope Partnership to make the event a success include: [Disciples Women's Ministries](#) and Pat Donahoo, executive director of DWM; NAPAD and Chun; the [Southwest region](#) of the Christian Church and Coretha Loughridge, acting regional minister and president for the Southwest Region and area minister for Northeast Area.

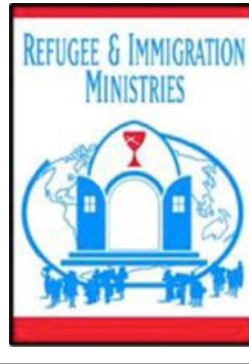

REFUGEE MINISTRIES



The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) is requested to resettle 8% of ALL refugees who enter thru Church World Service offices, and Disciples have assisted in resettling more than 40,000 refugees through Church World Service since the end of

World War II. To do that, we partner with our 34 CWS refugee affiliate offices all around the U.S. and Disciples have especially worked recently with refugees from Iraq, Burma, Afghanistan, Somalia, Bhutan, Syria, and the Congo.

We have received a request from our Disciples Refugee and Immigrant Ministry (RIM) to aid refugees through the Emergency Refugee Hospitality Kit Collection. Due to multiple refugee crises in the world at this time, increased numbers of refugees are expected. (Direct involvement with refugee families is needed from congregations within 50 miles of CWS Refugee offices. Our congregation is *not* one of those.)

It appears that we can best assist at this time by gathering needed items. We may either ship them, or perhaps even take a trip to one of the centers!

Items needed are:

Bedding Kits: 2 pillows, 2 pillowcases, 1 Queen sheet set, 1 quilt or bedspread

Bath Kits: 2 bath towels, 2 hand towels, 2 wash cloths, 6 bars soap, 2 toothbrushes & toothpaste

School Kits: 1 backpack, 2 notebooks, 100 sheets of 3 hole punched paper, 2 bottles glue, 2 packages crayons, 2 pair scissors, 4 pencils, 4 pens

School items should be new. Bedding and bath towels may be *gently* used. Items above are appreciated as a part of “kits” OR in bulk quantities.

(We continue to explore opportunities for us to respond in other ways. At this time, more Syrian refugees are not coming to St. Louis. We remain in touch with the International Institute here in St. Louis.)



Getting Ready for the ‘Tree of Warmth’

During the Advent – Christmas season, we will “decorate” a special tree –“The Tree of Warmth”

Our goal is to cover the Tree in the church hallway with warm socks, warm hats and scarves, mittens, and gloves. These are then distributed by Isaiah 58 Ministries to men, women, and children who need them in the coldest months of winter. We have heard that warm socks are in particular need by those on the street. Items may be purchased or handmade. The primary goal is that they are warm!

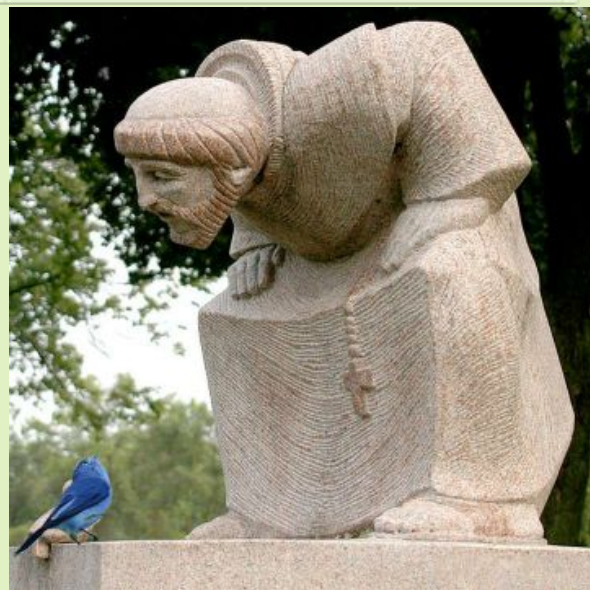
