

Compton Heights Christian Church has a strong ministry that is needed and vital to this community. I am moved again and again by the stories of people who are touched by this congregation's love, openness, and compassion. New people continue to find home and hope here. The core of congregational leadership is truly faithful and always seeking to live into God's vision, to respond to God and to the needs of God's people. How many times I have been absolutely moved to tears by

your commitment and your ministry. I believe with every fiber of my being that we need to be here in this place and this time bearing Christ's love.

In this week's Cabinet meeting, we began – again - the hard conversation about the challenge before us to continue in ministry. There was an irony. One person stated that on one hand we have much to celebrate – the ministry and the energy of the congregation – the new people who have come to be a part of this ministry. Still in the midst of this, we are at a time of financial crisis. This is not new; we have been challenged financially for years. We have been blessed with a couple of significant bequests that have helped us to continue in ministry. And we have worked on our faithfulness and grown in our stewardship. We have grown as a congregation in mission! So many of you have sacrificed and have increased in giving, and as a result, we have been lowering the amount of money we have needed to withdraw from the principle of bequest funds. We needed to close the gap, so that we could do our ministry, paying all our bills through our giving. We *were* closing the gap, but we have lost some givers. Therefore we have needed to continue to draw from the principle of our Christian Church Foundation funds. As of this week we have \$15,000 left. If you just gasped, felt a lump in your throat, you are in touch with reality! We cannot continue to draw funds to stay afloat.

We have been very frugal. In fact there are a number of church members who personally pay for items we need to carry out our ministry – down to the toilet paper! We decided several years ago that if we were just "surviving" we might as well not be here. We exist to do ministry: to worship with vitality; to reach out in nurture and care; to be about mission in the community and the world. In other words, we must be the community of Jesus the Christ in this place. or we have no business being here anyway. Kathy Mead is always reminding us of this deep truth.

When our Financial Secretary reports our giving, the reports are usually good. We are close to the amount we have pledged. *The thing to remember is that this is <u>what we pledged; it is not what it costs to</u> <u>do ministry for the year</u>. We have a bare bones budget, but we run about \$577 short each week. Our giving must still increase if we are to meet the budget. For, instance, this year so far we have withdrawn \$15,000 from our principle with CCF to pay our bills and we will likely need more. (In some years it has been more by this time, <i>but close only counts in horseshoes*. And as I said, there is only \$15,000 *total* left in CCF funds. There are certainly still changes we can and must make, but they must not be changes that reduce us to being less than the Church of Jesus Christ.

If you value Compton Heights Christian Church, and believe that we are called to continue ministry as a witness to God's liberating, life-giving love, I ask you to pray and act. What can you do to help strengthen the continuing ministry of this congregation? .Several years ago, Dave and I were looking at our giving and he suggested a number by which we could increase our giving. I said, "Can we even possibly do that?" Tears came to his eyes, and he said, "How can we not?" We have had those moments over and over through the years, when we take another step. God is always in it!

A reminder also that our giving is needed whether we are in worship on a Sunday or not!

This month's **Board Meeting has been moved to Wed.**, July 10th, 7:00 PM (because July 3rd was right on top of the holiday). Our Item for Reflection will be on the challenge before us. Board meetings are always open. We hope you will come be a part of the conversation.

Six Weeks of Compassion!



Each year we celebrate and give to **Week of Compassion** which is our Disciples of Christ Relief and Development ministry working in crisis situations throughout the world. Our work is extensive, deep, and ongoing in cooperation with Church World Service and with ecumenical and interfaith partners in every place. When tornadoes, hurricanes, or floods devastate communities in Joplin, MO, or Moore, OK, or Japan or Africa or Latin America, *we are there*. When war destroys communities and lives, we are there. We always say that "Week of Compassion" is more than a "week"; it is year 'round Compassion with a week of special emphasis for

our giving. THIS year, we will have a Summer Mission focus called **"Six Weeks of Compassion"** to extend from **July 28 through September 1**.

In addition to the WOC Offering, we will gather items and put together needed relief and disaster kits for Church World Service (CWS) and for distribution through the Festival of Sharing in Missouri.

Our Church World Service kits will be:

Emergency Clean-up Buckets.

The high number of recent floods and other disasters has depleted the CWS supply. These kits enable people to begin the devastating job of cleaning up after a disaster here in the U. S. *Our goal – at least 5 buckets*.

(Please sign up for the items you will bring so that together we can create complete buckets.)

EMERGENCY CLEAN-UP BUCKET

Shipping — \$3/kit **\$56** value 1 five-gallon bucket with re-sealable lid 1 pair work gloves 1 dry laundry detergent, 50-78 oz. 2 pairs latex gloves (like Playtex[®]) 24 - 28 count heavy-duty trash bags (30-45 gallon) 1 scrub brush 7 sponges, assorted sizes 5 scouring pads Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft. 48 - 50 clothes pins 18 cleaning towels (reusable, like Easy Wipes[®]) 5 dust masks 24 - 28 oz bottle antibacterial dish soap (like Dawn®) 1 12 oz. bottle concentrated cleaner (like Lysol®)

1 6-9 oz. bottle insect repellant (**No aerosol**)

Please purchase all liquids in plastic bottles. Send only new, unopened materials. Make sure lids on bottles are tightly closed. Put all items in the plastic bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment. Seal closed with lid and packing tape. Our Missouri kits will be:

Paper Products Packs

Imagine having a cold but no tissue to blow your nose. While a cloth handkerchief is an option, laundering is not always frequent so the more sanitary option is for disposable tissues to keep from passing on germs to other family members. Paper products cannot be purchased with SNAP benefits. These paper products are much needed in all households. The packs are distributed to food pantries and shelters across the state of Missouri.

PAPER PRODUCTS PACK \$14 value

3 packages toilet paper (4 double rolls) 2 rolls paper towels (good quality) 2 facial tissue (large rectangular boxes)

Place all items in a tall –sized kitchen trash bag. Close securely and place bagged kits in a box labeled "Paper Products Pack." Mark the quantity on each box.
