LEAVE

Lent has come early, leaving less time for the Epiphany days of reflecting on the Light that has come into the world. We had less of the story before Jesus began telling his disciples that he would suffer and die for the ministry of God's mercy and justice. Just after the first of the year, Dave and I went on a Witness for Peace delegation to Cuba. While we were there, nativity scenes remained outside churches in Havana. Two in particular had large scenes in permanent glass cases attached to the outside of church buildings. The scenes were so prominent that I was drawn immediately to them rather than to the buildings.

I wonder what those cases contain now. Will they contain some presentation of the stations of the cross? Will there be depictions of the Easter story? And though Ebenezer Baptist Church and the Centro Martin Luther King (where we stayed) did not have one of those scenes, I wonder what is going on there at this time? What do reflections on Jesus' road to the cross, look like and sound like in Cuba?

In every community and culture, we find ways to tell the stories at the heart of our faith and our lives. Therefore I must conclude that the Lenten time of reflection and prayer in Cuban churches will provide a means for the people to reflect on their particular journey with Jesus as they look forward with concern, hope, and a desire to protect the values of equity at the heart of their society while increasing resources for the livelihood of the people. As in the U.S., there is so much good and, at the same time, so much that is broken and in need of change. In every place, we are people of both compassion and of injustice.

As we engage honestly with Jesus' life, ministry, suffering, death, and resurrection, we can only be convicted, as we explore our values, our relationship with God, the choices we make, and how we respond to God's people. In these days of Lent, may Love be alive as we seek the way of Christ. Blessings, Jacque

LENT and EASTER at Compton Heights

Lent began with Ash Wednesday Worship on February 10 – held at Oak Hill Presbyterian Church. In that service, Pastor Jacque invited all of us to the experience of this reflective season as a community. There is certainly a personal aspect to Lent, however it is not limited to 'what <u>I give</u> up for Lent' or the condition of <u>my</u> heart in Lent. This is a time when we as a community of Jesus Christ prepare for and make together the journey that leads to the cross.
