

A TIME FOR LENT

It is *time* for Lent. I don't mean just that the calendar says that Lent begins on Wednesday, March 1st this year and that date has arrived. I mean that it is really *time for Lent*. (It feels a bit odd to place a judgment – better or worse, right time or wrong time - on *when* Lent comes. After all, the calculation is all about the moon! Easter falls on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox. If the first full moon occurs on the equinox, Easter is the following Sunday. Therefore Easter can fall anywhere between March 22 and April 25. So once you figure out the date for Easter, then you count back 6 weeks from the date of Easter to get the date of the First Sunday in Lent and Lent begins on Ash Wednesday which is the Wednesday before the First Sunday.) Well, THAT leaves my head spinning, so I just look at the calendar and go with it! I will say that sometimes Lent just begins too early for me. The earliest it can begin is February 4, and last year it began on February 10. In 2018, Ash Wednesday will be on February 14, which provides an interesting conflict in our culture But I digress ...

It's time! Lent began as a time of fasting leading to the celebration of Easter. The 40 days of Lenten fasting mirrored Jesus' 40 days of fasting in the wilderness. Lent lasts 46 days (40 fast days, and 6 Sundays, which are not fast days.) During those days in the wilderness, Jesus came face to face with his own mortality – yes! *Jesus'* mortality! He was tempted to mis-use God, and mis-use power; to turn away from who he was in order to make his life easier. He was tempted to turn away from his call to spend his very life for the love of God's people. He was tempted to save himself.

Some of us sense that we are already in the wilderness; the landscape is threatening and we feel vulnerable. We are concerned with how we respond to our own fear and hunger without abandoning our call to embody God's care for all who live with fear and hunger. We face being people of God in relationship with the empire, and like Jesus we need to find our way through the wilderness and down the mountain to do the work. Sometimes we just feel tired and lost. We struggle to find our authority, and with how to use our power in ways that are faithful to the God's love embodied in Jesus.

What we discover in the wilderness is that we are not alone. We can still hear the voice that says: This is my Beloved! The good news is that we are feeling our mortality and we are reminded that still we are alive!

It's a HUDDLE!


Kim Litton is hosting a HUDDLE on Tuesday, March 7, 6:30 - 8:00 pm.

Registration was due on February 25 and at this time 7 from our congregation plan to go. If you would still like attend, we can see if additions can be made.



Occasionally, we come across things from the past that we have forgotten. As I began work on plans for this Lent, I happened across a "CrossPaths" article that I wrote in 2012. I couldn't say it any better today and I feel it as deeply, so here it is (a re-run!):

As we begin this very special time in the Church Year, the season of Lent, a particular image stays with me. It is the image of children with the smudge of ash in the shape of a cross on their forehead. In last night's ecumenical Ash Wednesday service at St. John's Episcopal, I had the privilege of

preaching and then other participating pastors took the role of imposing ashes on the foreheads of those who came forward.

After the imposition of ashes, I looked out from the chancel and there was little Hugo Hagel happily toddling up the aisle with ash on his face. Then I began to catch in my line of sight other children, from toddlers to elementary age children, all with the mark of the cross in ash. It is not unusual to see children with smudges on their faces – dirt, that pea-green baby food, spaghetti sauce, cake-icing; but it takes your breath for a moment when it is the dark, intentional ash of the palm in the shape of the cross.

When we impose ashes, it is a reminder of our mortality and our utter dependence on God. We normally say "You are dust and to dust you shall return." When I impose ashes on a young child, I tend to say something like, "God has made you human, Jesus loves you, and will always be with you." But in my mind are those words that I can't shake: "You are dust and to dust you shall return." It is a statement that catches us by surprise every time; the hard truth that this life, this mortal body will die and will be no more. It feels different to say it to someone who has lived a good long life already, and to smudge that ash on a face that is a bit wrinkled with age; someone who has considered his or her own mortality. But when we touch that fresh smooth skin of a baby with the ash, it is just almost too much.

At the beginning of this Lent, I am aware that our mortality is ever before us; so much so lately that the heaviness for ALL of us is almost too much. Yet the message of Lent is not simply that we are mortal and that we sin, but that we are held in the grace and forgiveness and love of God who will never let us go! That is the truth we carry with us as we travel this journey toward Holy Week and then Easter. We are human AND we are wrapped in the holy love of God! We are broken AND we are embraced by God who calls us to turn around and look into the compassionate eyes of Jesus the Christ. We sin AND we are made whole in God's forgiveness.

Yes, I want every child and every adult to be reminded in these days that "God has made you human (you are dust and to dust you shall return), Jesus loves you, and will always be with you!

May this be a Holy Lent and a journey of deepening faith for all of us.

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William Barnett Blakemore was the fourth dean of the Disciples Divinity House of the University of Chicago, serving from 1945 until his death in 1975. He was also Associate Dean of Rockefeller Memorial Chapel, the University of Chicago from 1959-66. On June 13, 1963, Dean Blakemore prayed this prayer in Rockefeller Chapel.

In a time when many voices call us away from reason and love and bid us gain a taste for violence and prejudice, strengthen within us, O Lord, the determination to find your will and do it. Prevent us from any pride, whether of tribe or family or race or creed or region. Save us, for our land is sick with pride, for it is pride that has bred prejudice and greed that has provoked wrong. And the nation that above all nations you have blessed with material goods does not yet know how to spread your bounty to all your children. Amen.

May the Christ who walks on wounded feet, walk with us on the road. May the Christ who serves with wounded hands, stretch out our hands to serve. May the Christ who loves with a wounded heart, open our hearts to love.
